
The philosophy of our program is that children benefit from a program that is family and community centered. We feel that parents are their child's first teachers and that connections within the community strengthen a child's development.




Children learn by doing. The Early Learning programs strive to provide each child with hands-on experiences


to encourage the child to be creative, imaginative, innovative, and to create a desire to explore and learn. We want to inspire/instill a lifelong love of learning.




Family Demographics

OF THE 226 FAMILIES SERVED...





Disabilities Services

Identifying young children with unique developmental needs, ensuring children receive appropriate and timely services and helping families navigate eligibility guidelines is essential to the Head Start Birth to Five Program. The Office of Head Start requires 10% of the total funded enrollment must be children with special needs.

17% of EHS students received services through an IFSP (9/52).

17% of HS students received services through an IEP (26/153).

17% of students program wide received services through an IFSP/IEP (funded enrollment) (35/205).

Mental Health

RCCAC partnered with Hopewell Health for mental health consultation services. All classroom staff received assistance from a mental health consultant through observation or consultation. The program was able to offer a weekly 30-minute session with Soundscape Music Therapy to the classrooms at Ohio University-Chillicothe. Due to scheduling and the availability of therapist, the services were unable to be provided to the Bainbridge and Huntington locations.

The staff also continued to focus on the implementation of







classrooms! Several staff started off the program year by attending a Conscious Discipline Reboot training that was hosted by OHSAI.

Health Services

100% of Early Head Start children had health insurance. 98% enrolled in Medicaid and the remaining 2% enrolled in other health insurance options. 100% of enrolled pregnant women received Medicaid.

100% of Early Head Start children were determined to be up to date on a schedule of age-appropriate preventive and primary health care by the end of enrollment!

100% of Early Head Start children were determined to be up to date or in compliance with the state guidelines for an exemption on immunizations!

Dental Exams and Treatment

100% of Early Head Start children had access to preventative care and dental treatment by the end of the program year, which was up from 96% at the beginning. 100% of Early Head Start children completed a dental exam during the program year!

100% of Head Start children had access to preventative care and dental treatment during the program year. Of those with access, 89% completed a professional



dental examination during the program year. Of the 154 students that completed a dental examination, 38 (25%) of them were diagnosed as needing dental treatment; 24 children (63%) received the treatment by the end of the program year.

The program partners with First Capital Dental to conduct dental exams at the center twice per program year!

Nutrition

2023-2024 Parent Survey

- **82.5%** reported that their child was more socially prepared for school after attending RCCAC EHS/HS!
- 87.5% reported that RCCAC EHS/HS program supported their child in developing academically!

- **72.5%** reported participating in the homework activities that were sent home with their child.


















































Professional Development

Most Recent Financial Audit

The annual financial audit is taken to the Board annually for approval. The Independent Auditor's report by The Tidwell Group, LLC. through December 2023 indicated no findings or questioned costs relative to federal awards.

Monitoring

- The program had a successful Focus Area 2 Review in October of 2023! An "Area of Concern" in Safe and Sanitary Environments was identified during the review. The concern was that the program did not have the water in the facilities directly tested or lead but rather relied upon the county/city water tests (which showed no lead concerns in the water). The program received T/TA from the Program Specialist around the subject; no further action was determined to be needed.
- The program had a successful CLASS Review in the Spring of 2024!




